- The inaugural BNP Paribas Banque Privée Prize. *A focus on the French Scene* was awarded to Nathalie Du Pasquier at the Art Paris opening ceremony on 3<sup>rd</sup> April 2024.
- This prize rewards the unique career of an artist who has not yet received all the recognition she deserves in France whose hybrid multidisciplinary practice is resonating with a new generation of contemporary artists.

The BNP Paribas Banque Privée Prize. A focus on the French Scene was jointly launched in 2024 by BNP Paribas Banque Privée and Art Paris as a means of supporting the French art scene. It rewards the career of an artist (regardless of age) chosen from among those selected by guest curator Eric de Chassey for his themed focus "Fragile Utopias".

Nathalie Du Pasquier (born 1957) began her career as a designer. She was a founding member of the Memphis Group that brought together a collective of designers and architects around Ettore Sottsass from 1981 to 1986. Since 1987, two and three-dimensional painting has been one of her main centres of interest, a practice she has approached from the angles of both figuration and abstraction. Throughout her career, Du Pasquier has been intrigued by the relationship between objects and the space in which they are situated. Her colourful and often playful abstract motifs appear across paintings that often connect with their surroundings - tables, rugs, books and ceramics - to create a complete and immersive environment. Du Pasquier lives and works in Milan. She has been the subject of major monographic exhibitions, for example at Kunsthalle Wien (Austria) in 2016, MACRO, Museum of Contemporary Art of Rome in 2021 and more recently in France at the MRAC (Sérignan) in 2022. Her drawings are currently being showcased at the Hôtel des Arts in Toulon.

In 2020, Gaël Charbau looked at common and uncommon stories, whereas the 2021 theme curated by Hervé Mikaeloff focused on portraiture and figuration. In 2022, Alfred Pacquement looked at natural histories. Last year's fair addressed the notion of art and commitment with curator Marc Donnadieu and in 2024, Eric de Chassey is presenting "Fragile Utopias".
